Steps for Safety Highway-Rail Grade Crossings

1. Approach with care.

Warn others that you are slowing down. Turn on 4-way flashers. Use pull-out lane if available.

2. Prepare to stop.

Turn off fans and radio and roll down windows. Locate your cell phone for use in emergency.

Stop at least 15 feet, but not more than 50 feet, from nearest rail.

- 3. Look both ways and listen carefully. Bend forward to see around mirrors and A-pillars.
- 4. If it won't fit, don't commit. Do not enter a crossing unless you can drive completely through without stopping!

And, remember, trains are wider than the track. Before you pull onto the track, make sure there is enough room on the other side for the back of your vehicle (and any overhanging cargo) to be at least 6 feet beyond the furthest rail.

Look again.

Before you move, look again in both directions.

6. Cross tracks with care.

Signal, watch for a safe gap, pull back onto the road if you used a pull-out lane. Use highest gear that will let you cross without shifting.

7. Keep going once you start, even if lights start to flash or gates come down.

Roadcheck 2013 Results—Commercial Vehicle Compliance Still Shows Room for Improvement; One in Five Vehicles Inspected Placed Out-of-Service During Three-Day Event

The results are in for the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance's Roadcheck 2013, which took place June 4-6. Commercial vehicle inspectors across North America completed 73,023 truck and bus inspections during the 72-hour enforcement and safety outreach campaign.

Washington, DC (PRWEB) September 11, 2013 -- Commercial vehicle inspectors across North America completed 73,023 truck and bus inspections during 72 hours of Roadcheck 2013, the premier annual enforcement and safety outreach campaign carried out by the members of the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA). Of those inspections, a total of 47,771 were North American Standard Level I inspections—the most comprehensive roadside inspection, in which vehicles and drivers are assessed for violations of federal, state or Canadian provincial safety regulations. Other inspections conducted were vehicle-only or driver-only inspections. Of Level I inspections conducted in Canada and the U.S., 24.1% were found with Out-of-Service (OOS) violations. There were a total of 71,630 driver inspections, including those conducted during Level I inspections, from which 4.3% were found with OOS violations. There were 899 seatbelt violations issued.

Roadcheck 2013 included special emphasis on motorcoach safety, including traffic enforcement, as well as securement of cargo. Motorcoaches account for a fraction of the commercial vehicles on the road, but the importance of their safe operation is compounded by the many passengers they must safely deliver to their destinations. Jurisdictions reported a total of 1,471 motorcoaches were inspected during Roadcheck this year. CVSA also collaborated with the International Association of Chiefs of Police to request their support in conducting enforcement of traffic safety laws on bus and motorcoach drivers.

Cargo securement related violations represented 11.7% of all OOS violations issued during the event, down slightly from 12.3% in 2012. Although this equates to only one out of every 50 vehicles inspected, loss of a load by a commercial truck is always a severe risk to safety. Inspectors always watch for signs of improperly secured loads such as inadequate number of tie downs, damaged webbing or chain, and other load securement violations.

Brakes routinely stand out in the mix of OOS violations issued during Roadcheck. This year, 49.6% of vehicle OOS violations were related to brake adjustment and other brake system violations. Additionally, performance based brake testers or PBBTs were used during Roadcheck 2013. Nine U.S. states and one Canadian province are equipped with PBBT systems for enforcement use. Of the 287 enforcement inspections conducted with a PBBT, 36 vehicles or 12.5% were found with overall braking efficiency below the minimum required by U.S. regulation and the North American Standard OOS Criteria.

CVSA estimates that over 10,000 CVSA and FMCSA inspectors participated at approximately 2,500 locations across North America during this year's Roadcheck. On an annual basis, nearly 4 million inspections are conducted across the continent.

CVSA President Mark Savage, a major with the Colorado State Patrol, noted that "the strong enforcement presence involved in Roadcheck and throughout the year is a critical component in our safety efforts across

- All inspections: 79.4% of vehicles passed, and 20.6% were placed out-of-service (20.9% were out-of-service in 2012).
- All Level 1 inspections: 75.9% of vehicles passed, and 24.1% were placed out-of-service (22.4% were out-of-service in 2012).
- HazMat: 83.5% of vehicles passed the inspection, and 16.5% were placed out-of-service (15.6% were out-of-service in 2012).
- Passenger carrying vehicles: 92.9% of vehicles passed the inspection, and 7.1% were placed out-of-service (8.6% were out-of-service in 2012).

- Help law enforcement agencies and organizations effectively prepare and protect our highways and citizens from security threats.

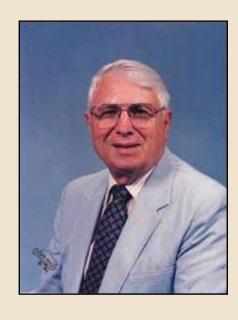

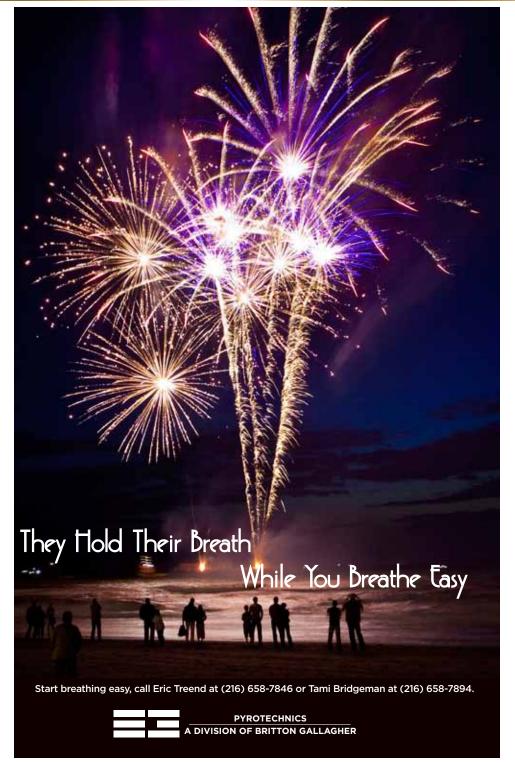

Garry Hanson Candidate for Vice-president

It all started with making Fireworks in high School as a science project from the interest of chemistry and physics. When drafted I decided to enlisted in to the military and learned more about pyrotechnics and explosive from the US Navy Special training. Served 6 years with 3 tours of duty in Vietnam with the Amphibious Construction Seabees land based in country at many locations. When discharged in 1969 from active duty I started back in to manufacturing fireworks as a hobby, but it soon became a serious affliction for seeking more information to develop new colors and types of fireworks from consumer too professional types.

In 1975 I became more active with the Northern Lighters Pyrotechnics, Inc. (NLPI.) Then in 1977 was voted the president and served 16 years as president or vice president until the 1990's.

Joined the Pyrotechnics Guild Incorporated (PGI) in 1977 and have maintained membership since that time. At the 1981 PGI annual convention I competed and won Grand Master that year. I have had the privilege to have performed many demos and dozens of seminars from building angled comet racks (1980) to 12" Shell of Shells throughout the years.

Started a company called Precocious Pyrotechnics, Inc. (PPI) a full Manufacturing & Display company during the late 1970's which continues today.

Helped start the Western Pyrotechnics Association (WPA) and I am a founding member. Been able to have performed many demos as well as numerous seminars and performed the first demo in Mesquite NV 1989 convention.

Joined the American Pyrotechnics Association (APA) in the early 1980's and have the privilege to be on many of that organization committees.

Then when many of us USA manufactures were experiencing problem with the USDOT about consumer fireworks cakes a group of fireworks business men gathered and the National Fireworks Association (NFA) was formed from those meetings. This allowed me to again be a founding member of another fireworks organization to help form the great NFA.

Before the NFA started I had become active with an organization called National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA). By starting the NFA and being a Pyrotechnic and Fireworks manufacture this allowed me to go ahead of many people on a waiting list to be added as a principle member of the NFPA Pyrotechnics Committee representing the manufacture side of the industry. I have held that position now for 23 years representing the NFA with a pro-fireworks point of view on these codes: NFPA 1122, 1123, 1124, 1125, 1126/160, 1127, 1128, 1129.

Glacial Ridge Fireworks Inc. (GRFI) was started by converted another one of my other companies during the 1990's into a consumer's fireworks type of company. Doing so allowed me to be more active on that side of the fireworks business, and first hand see the problems that face that industry.

Somehow I found time to write a book called 'How It Happens At the Fireworks Factory'. That book was written for young people to give a picture view of what is behind the scene of fireworks and too spur young people's interests in to chemistry and physics. We were also very lucky to donate many of those books to school libraries.

If you vote me Vice President of the NFA, I will try my hardest to keep an eye on the horizon of striving to continue with the base ideals of why the NFA was started for initially.

Let's all keep Fireworks safe though education and availability to all!

Musings by Jack Leonard

Henderson Wood (A Moral for Retailers)

My father did many nice things for me when I was a lad. He took me to baseball games and music lessons. He taught me how to shoot a rifle, and he instilled in his son an appreciation for hard work. However, the nicest thing he ever did for me came about as a result of the nervous breakdown he suffered in the spring of 1962.

After experiencing months of stress on the job, Dad was advised by his doctor to take a two week vacation so that his mind could heal. Since he had an old friend in Florida, he hopped on the Greyhound and headed south to Ft. Myers.



Upon his return, he excitedly related to us the joys of Dixie: the grits, the flowers, and the hospitality, and he promised to take us there during that summer.

So while my parents planned visits to Cypress Gardens, Marine Land, and Silver Springs, I was awaiting the opportunity to buy lots of fireworks in Virginia, South Carolina, and Georgia.

We left Baltimore on a humid July morning and headed down Route 301, the main north-south artery at the time. About two hours later, we crossed the Potomac and stopped at Stuckey's for a drink. As I entered the air conditioned comfort of the store, I saw them! An entire counter piled high with sparklers, fountains, and wheels. I grabbed a small shopping basket, filled it to the brim, and approached the front counter where my dad was paying for a cup of papaya juice. When he turned around and saw the basket in my hands, he said, "You can't buy any fireworks on this trip. They're illegal in Maryland."

I could have cried, and as we stopped at every Stuckey's, Atkinson's, and Horne's, all I could do was drool over the forbidden fruit on the counter and promise myself that I would return to the South without my parents and gorge myself on all the fireworks I could afford.

That opportunity came in August of 1966 just before I returned to college. My pyro buddy Joe Gross and I convinced my folks that we simply had to see Fort Sumter since we had recently acquired an all-consuming interest in the War between the States. After a lot of coaxing, my dad handed me the car keys and said, "Be careful, have fun, and make a lot of memories." Oh, if he had only known the memories we intended to make!

Joe and I made record time to South Carolina in the Rambler and visited every fireworks store from South of the Border to the Georgia line. As we purchased a variety of items, we thought that we were experiencing the highlight of the trip, but we were wrong. Ever so wrong!

After a day or two of shopping along the interstate, we decided to visit Myrtle Beach and see what the mom and pop retailers were offering. On our first evening there, we drove north on Route 17 to the Ocean Drive area, a part of what is today North Myrtle Beach. The road was bordered by tall pines dripping with Spanish moss. Insects hollered in the darkness.

Shortly we sighted an eerie glow in the distance and headed for it. In a clearing hewn from the forest was a large, red neon sign shaped like a firecracker that read Wood's Fireworks. We pulled onto the lot and entered the store, not realizing that we were about to experience a truly remarkable evening in a pyro paradise. To my left was an old grocery store freezer of the type that once held Birdseye orange juice. In its three compartments were literally thousands of loose cherry bombs, silver salutes, and M-80s. Above was a sign that said: "Y'all take what you need. A nickel a pop."

Next to the freezer was an entire shelf of firecrackers bearing such exotic names as Lobster, Crab, Sea Horse, Anchor, Red Leaf, Black Widow, and American Buffalo. These were available from penny packs to strings of 2,000, and every single one was made in Macau and bore an ICC designation.

Across the aisle from the crackers were the aerial bombs from single shot to nine shot. #2 and #3 whistling aerials were there as well and so was the big #100 tube by Rozzi with the warning: Caution....Extra Loud!

And on the next shelf were the aerial spinners: Buzz Bombs and Helicopters by Zenith and Silver Jet from Ohio ranging in price from a quarter to thirty five cents.

The rockets rested on an entire shelf near the far side of the store. Oh, the rockets! Six ounce for a quarter, eight ounce for fifty cents, and a buck for a 2 pounder! Kent rockets, Longhorn rockets, and rockets by Stars and Stripes.

Candles occupied the shelf near the cash register. Candles with 5, 10, 12, 15, and 20 balls were all available and were sporting stiff black match fuses.

After spending almost an hour drooling over the treasures, we were approached by the store's owner, Henderson Wood, who said he could tell we liked fireworks by the way we lovingly picked up each piece. When we readily agreed, he handed Joe a \$5.00 bill and directed him to visit the Squeaky Pig Drive In across the road for a couple six packs of Miller which, he said, would get the conversation rolling.

And talk we did. Mr. Wood told us about his fireworks suppliers, how much he paid for case lots, and how he would be happy to get us wholesale prices on anything we wanted.

It was near midnight when we finally left the store. As we headed back to the beach, the big red sign flickered out and the darkness enveloped the area. There was little sleeping that night as we rehashed what we had learned and agreed that our evening at Wood's Fireworks was a real milestone in our pyrotechnic lives.

Over the next 15 years, I often traveled to Myrtle Beach on vacation with a wife and two children, and on each trip I found time to visit Henderson and drop a few hundred dollars. At these times, he's recollect about the evening in 1966 that he spent with the two Yankee boys who loved fireworks.

When I visited the beach in 1984, I was saddened to see that Wood's Fireworks was closed. I inquired across the street at the drive in and learned that several thugs had approached Mr. Wood as he was closing his store on January 10th of that year. In a botched robbery attempt, Henderson was shot and died on his lot.

My experiences with Henderson Wood can serve as a lesson to all fireworks retailers like myself. If you take an interest in your customers, if you take time to talk with them, and if you seem happy to help them, they will keep coming back year after year as I did with Mr. Wood.

And I shall end with this: Thank you for the memories, Henderson Wood: June 19th, 1930 to January 10th, 1984. You might be gone, but you are not forgotten. May you rest in peace.

A Quick Guide to CVSA Roadside Inspections

LEVEL I

North American Standard Inspection

The most thorough driver/vehicle roadside inspection. A 37 step procedure that includes an examination of both the driver and vehicle. The driver inspection includes items such as the license and endorsements, hours of service, possible use of alcohol and drugs, and seat belts. The vehicle inspection includes items such as the brake system, coupling devices, exhaust system, frame, fuel system, lights, safe loading, steering mechanism, suspension, tires, van and open-top trailer bodies, wheels and rims, windshield wipers, and emergency exits on buses.

LEVEL II

Walk-Around Driver/Vehicle Inspection

An examination that includes each item specified under the North American Standard Inspection that can be inspected without physically getting under the vehicle.

LEVEL III

Driver-Credential Inspection

A roadside examination of the driver's license, endorsements, medical certification and the driver's record of duty status, seat belt, vehicle inspection report, and hazardous materials.

LEVEL IV

Special Inspections

These inspections include a one-time examination of a particular item and are normally made in support of a study or to verify or refute a suspected trend.

LEVEL V

Vehicle-Only Inspection

An inspection, usually conducted at the motor carrier terminal, that includes each vehicle inspection item specified under the North American Standard Inspection (Level I), without a driver present.

LEVEL VI

Enhanced North American Standard Inspection for Radioactive Shipments

An inspection for select radiological shipments that includes all requirements of the Level I inspection, and enhancements due to specific radiological requirements. These inspections are conducted only on highway route controlled quantities of radioactive materials.

LEVEL VII

Jurisdictional Mandated Inspection

An inspection that does not meet the requirements of any other level of inspection. An example would include inspection programs such as, but not limited to: school buses; limousines; taxis; shared ride; hotel courtesy shuttles; and, other intrastate/intraprovincial operations.

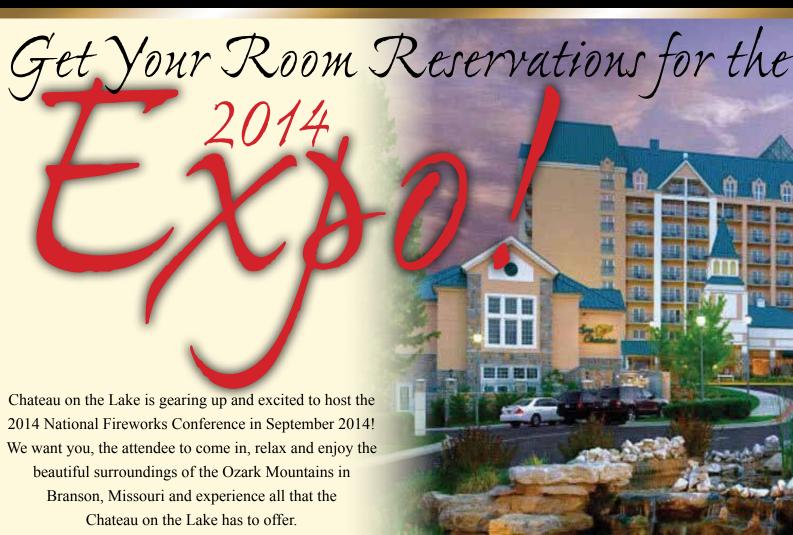

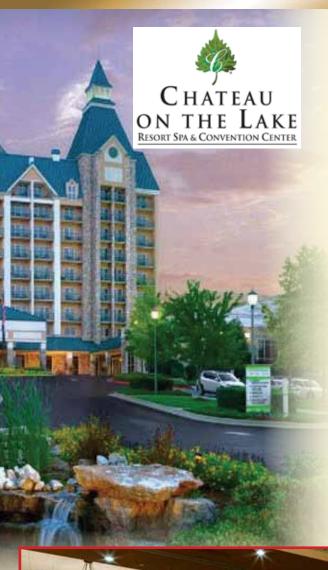

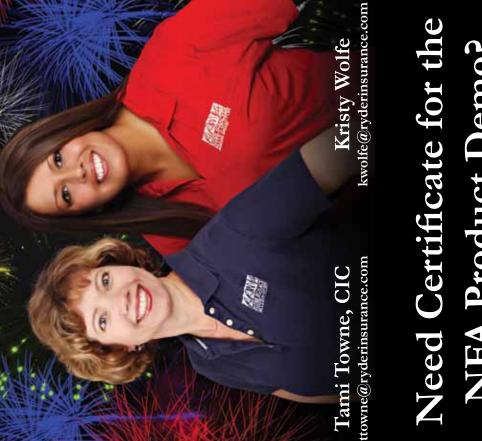
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
